Thomas Green is currently Chief Examiner and Pedagogy Specialist at The Royal Conservatory. In addition, he is Lead Facilitator for The Royal Conservatory's online Teacher Certification courses. He has conducted examinations and workshops on behalf of The Royal Conservatory and adjudicated at music festivals across North America. A former Editor-in-Chief of The Frederick Harris Music Company, he holds a Bachelor's degree from McGill University, a Master's in Performance from the Université de Montréal and a Ph.D. in Music History from Brandeis University, where he completed a dissertation on the compositional process of Jean-Philippe Rameau. His piano teachers included Clifford Poole in Toronto and Yvonne Hubert in Montreal, and he studied accompaniment under John Newmark.

Dr. Green has taught music history at McGill University and The University of Toronto and for many years served as an instructor in music history and theory at The University of Windsor. His research interests include the history of Baroque performance practice and the history of pedagogy, and he has delivered presentations on both areas of interest at national and international conferences.

Dr. Green currently teaches piano, music history and harmony in his private studio and at the Académie Ste Cécile in Windsor.
